Bingo Capital of the U.S.?

No, it's not Las Vegas. In fact, even considering the entire state, Nevada isn't close. A report by gambling.com pegs Montana as the easy bingo capital of the U.S. and likely the world, with 28.4 bingo halls per 100,000 residents. Vermont is a distant second at 8.2 bingo halls. Montana has 324; Pennsylvania has the most at 702. Nevada? It ranks 45th in the U.S. with just 24 bingo halls, which is .7 per 100,000 residents. Hawaii and Tennessee have no bingo halls.

Death Bingo?!

We receive quite a few questions about bingo variants around the world and online. The following information aims to answer all the questions in one go!

At the heart of North American bingo culture lies the 75-ball variant, known for its creative patterns that players aim to complete on their 5x5 grid with 25 squares.

Across the pond, 90-ball bingo reigns supreme, especially in the UK, Australia, and parts of Europe. Characterized by its 9x3 grid (27 squares total); this version unfolds over three stages: one line, two lines, and finally, a full house, where all numbers on a card are called. The gradual buildup and multiple winners make 90-ball bingo a fun social ex-

Less common Bingo variations include:

- primarily Speed bingo: played online: with 30 balls and a compact 3x3 grid, games are fast-paced and can be completed in just a few minutes.
- 80-ball bingo: this version emerged in the U.K. and is now particularly popular on online platforms there; it consists of a 4x4 grid with 16 squares; balls are divided into four colorcoded groups.

World Series Poker Winner

Poker superstar Michael Mizrachi won this year's World Series of Poker in July, raking in a cool \$10 million, raising his lifetime tournament winnings to \$29 million, and earning his eighth WSOP bracelet. He'd already won the WSOP Poker Players Championship this year for the fourth time. Mizrachi was down to three blinds on Day 8, just this close to being eliminated, when he mounted an epic comeback, making the final table with the second highest chip count. On Day 2 of the Final Table, he busted out two of the remaining four players in the first two hands and took down the championship in 24 total hands. Leonore "Leo" Margets, only the second woman to reach the final table in WSOP history, was eliminated in seventh place, winning \$1.5 million; she had the fifth highest chip count at the beginning of Day 1.

Gaming Hall of Fame Inductees

This year's inductees to the American Gaming Association's Gaming Hall of Fame are David Berman, Ann Simmons Nicholson, and Charles Lombardo. The Hall of Fame "honors the visionaries who've shaped today's gaming industry." Berman is gaming merg-

- Death Bingo, a variant that mixes dark humor with a dash of suspense. Here, the stakes are high, and tensions tend to rise, as the first person to shout "Bingo!" is, ironically, eliminated from the game. This twist keeps players on the edge of their seats, as they balance the

Joey Chestnut Does It Again

Joey "Jaws" Chestnut made a triumphant return to the Nathan's July 4th Hot Dog Eating Contest after a year's absence due to a contract dispute. He scarfed 70.5 hot dogs in the allotted 10 minutes in front of a lively crowd at Coney Island and took back the Mustard Belt, plus the \$10,000 first-place prize. It was his 17th win in the contest and his 10th in the last 11 years, but he didn't beat his own record of 76 hot dogs in 2021. Patrick Bertoletti, who won last year's competition, was a distant second, downing a mere 46.5 dogs and buns. In the women's contest, reigning champion Miki Sudo won again by eating 33 dogs, way short of her record 51 last year.

That is on top of the resort fees, parking charges, and various other costs that have become a fact of life for Las Vegas tourists." The early conclusion: "Now, after a post-pandemic boom, there are signs the Strip has pushed visitors to a tipping point" and then come the numbers we all know and love, the ongoing drop in visitation and gross gaming revenue. The "ridiculous prices" in the headline are a direct quote from Anthony Curtis, the most widely recognized and quoted expert on Las Vegas in the world, who was interviewed for the story.



Dear Conflicted,

Divvying up personal possessions among adult children or other loved ones can often be a tricky task. Deciding who should get what without showing favoritism, hurting someone's feelings or causing a feud can be difficult, even for close-knit families who enter the process with the best of intentions. Family battles can also escalate over whether things are being divided fairly by monetary value. So, for items of higher value like your jewelry, antiques and art, consider getting an appraisal to assure fair distribution. To locate an appraiser in your area, try ISA-appraisers. org, Appraisers.org or AppraisersAssociation.org.

Dividing Fairly

The best solution for passing along your personal possessions is for you to go through your house with your kids or other heirs either separately or all at once to find out which items they would like to inherit and why. They may have some emotional attachment to something you're not aware of. If more than one child wants the same thing, you'll have to make the ultimate decision.

Then you need to sit down and make a list of who gets what on paper, signed, dated and referenced in your will. You can revise it anytime you want. You may also want to consider writing an additional letter or create an audio or video recording that further explains your intentions.

You can also specify a strategy for divvying up the rest of your property. Here are some popular methods that are fair and reasonable:

Take turns choosing: Use a round-robin process where your kids take turns choosing the items they

would like to have. If who goes first becomes an issue, they can always flip a coin or draw straws. Also, to help simplify things, break down the dividing process room-by-room, versus tackling the entire house. To keep track of who gets what, either make a list or use adhesive dots with a color assigned to each person to tag the item.

Have a family auction: Give each person involved the same amount of play money or use virtual points or poker chips to bid on the items they want

Use online resources: For families who want help or live far apart, there are web-based resources like Fair-Split.com that can assist with the dividing process.

For more tips, see Who Gets Grandma's Yellow Pie Plate? – a resource created by the University of Minnesota Extension Service that offers a free video and detailed workbook for \$12.50 that gives pointers to help families discuss property distribution issues and lists important factors to keep in mind that can help you avoid or manage conflict.

It's also very important that you discuss your plans in advance with your kids so they can know ahead what to expect. Or you may even want to start distributing some of your items now, while you are still alive.


